The philosophy student explores and seeks to understand values and the nature of reality. What is truth? What is morally right? What kind of life is best? What kind of society? Is there an ultimate reality? Philosophy studies questions such as these that most other subject areas are unable to address fully.

With a philosophy degree, students enter the work force with a strong skill set including the following abilities: to read and comprehend complex material; to find and evaluate relevant evidence; to analyze problems, propose solutions, and examine them self-critically. Graduates have gone on to graduate school for law, education, or further philosophical study. Others enter new fields of research, working on computer problems or artificial intelligence, or they pursue career opportunities in government, industry, finance, and social services.

Requirements for the Major:

NOTE: No more than 48 units in philosophy courses can apply to the major.

Language Requirement:	Competency (successfully completing the third college semester or fifth college quarter) is required in one foreign language to fulfill the graduation requirement.
Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement:	Passing the Writing Placement Assessment with a score of 10 or completing one of the approved upper division writing courses (W) with a grade of C (2.0) or better.
